- Answer the question, "is this book a good tool for learning history?" Support your answer in a well-written paragraph.
- No plagiarism!

Projects will be due on the first day of class and will be worth 100 points. Please note that because the history of the world is filled with violence some of these books may contain disturbing scenes; do some research before choosing a book if that would be a problem for you.
